A WALK THROUGH THE GARDEN

With the warm weather looking like it is finely going to stay, everyone is getting out and enjoying the garden. The hard work put in by the volunteers and students is paying off with lush growth and wonderful displays of colour and shape. From the Chinese Dogwood (*Cornus kousa* var. *chinensis*) by the Dolphin Ponds to the Trumpet Vine (*Campsis radicans*) at the Pool House Arbour to the Primulas (*Primula* sp.) and Foxgloves (*Digitalis purpurea*) scattered around the garden, there are signs of a great summer of flowers. Our blue poppies (*Meconopsis betonicifolia*) are attracting a lot of attention right now as they are blooming for the first time. Soon the perennial bed on the main lawn will be out in full, as will the planting of annuals in the Viburnum bed between the

Cottage and Main House.

Up in the forest the eagle's nest is once again occupied. We have had several reports of adult eagles bringing food to the young. Hopefully some lucky person will be watching from the pullout as they take their first flight later this summer.

With the help of our summer students (George, John and Lindsey) from Malaspina's Horticulture Technician Program we hope to take on a number of different projects this summer. I will also be sneaking in plants throughout the garden as the season moves along, so drop by and see if you can spot any of the new changes.

SNIPPETS

Several weeks ago, I had the wonderful opportunity to explore some of the nurseries and gardens of Salt Spring Island with my propagation group (aka the PGs). We headed out, 11 women armed with money, credit cards, and the back of a small pick-up truck to fill. We were determined to head home when either the money was spent or there was no room left in the back of the truck.

One of our stops included a visit to a greenhouse that specializes in Pelargoniums. The selection was incredible and everyone who was on the trip took home something unique to enjoy over the summer.

In order to enjoy the plants again next year take cuttings from your mother plant late this summer. Pelargoniums are terrific plants to propagate and all you need is a place indoors where you can over winter them. I have found that without a heated greenhouse the mother plants do not over-winter well and it is best to have new plants from cuttings. Here is how to make more of them.

- 1) Take nodal tip cuttings in mid August or early September.
- 2) Use rooting powder #1
- 3) Use a mix of 50% peat to 50% perlite or

vermiculite to stick your cuttings in.

- 4) Cuttings can be stuck in individual pots or an open seed tray.
- 5) Keep the cuttings misted while rooting and provide bottom heat.
- 6) Once rooted remove them from the heat and mist and grow on in cooler conditions with lots of good light.
- 7) If these cuttings start to become too leggy cut them back to branch out and root the pieces you cut off.
- 8) I fertilized my cuttings every two weeks with a 14-14-14 fertilizer cut by ½ to keep them from growing too big
- 9) In the spring when the weather begins to warm up begin hardening your plants off by moving them to a cold frame.

P.S we left Salt Spring with little money and no room left in the truck!

"On May 25th Milner Gardens had the opportunity to partake in Qualicum Beach Family Day Parade and activities with a booth at the Civic Centre promoting the Roots & Shoots program."

Over the last 8 weeks grade 3 students from Arrowview Elementary have been gardening up a storm. We have had a fantastic time getting to know each other and growing together. Students and mentors have planted carrots, radishes, beans, peas, chard, and spinach. We've learned a little bit of Latin, about edible Native Plants, mason bees, hummingbirds, butterflies, aphids, slugs and other bugs, and beneficial plants. We have learned the characteristics and some of the plants in the aster, pea, mint, nightshade, and carrot families. Students know how to transplant, weed, and water (they are experts at watering!). And they have even had to learn the hard lesson of "sharing" the garden with rabbits.

At the heart of this program are the mentors. I have greatly enjoyed the time I've spent with them. I am so thankful to have had such a wonderful and dedicated group of volunteers to work with. Every week they would go the extra step to bring something in to show the kids (and me!) or have a great piece of information that they were willing to share with the rest of us. It has truly been a terrific experience and I look forward to many more.

Over the summer, the Roots and Shoots

program will be offered to schools and other organizations. These visits will be organized as one-time activities where students or groups of children can visit the garden and take part in one of the Roots and Shoots gardening activities. This is a new adventure for us at Milner Gardens and Woodland and we can only grow from here.
